## First day of OCS strike closes and disrupts courts

Striking PCS members force court closures and severe disruptions on first day of a four-day action over pay.

Security officers in 149 courts across England and Wales today (22 September) started a four-day strike over pay, after being offered just 38p above the National Living Wage.

The action, which continues on **25, 27 and 29 September**, has seen hundreds of PCS members take action, forming strong and lively picket lines across the country.

Boosted by a rise in membership of 50 members working for contractor OCS in September alone, this action has already forced the closure of many courts across England and Wales, causing a large number of court cases to be cancelled or disrupted.

As a direct result of the action of our members, many courts have also either operated with inadequate staffing levels or brazenly used contingency labour which includes inexperienced or unvetted staff.

In Liverpool Crown Court, the <u>court building had to be evacuated</u> during the strike action by PCS security officers because security guidelines were breached.

This occurred because agency workers were asked to cover a role they're not trained for. Although no harm was done today, the chaos underlines the importance of having trained professionals running the security of our courts.

The remaining days of action (25, 27 and 29 September) are expected to further impact the running of these almost 150 courts in England and Wales.
